
History of Architectural Technology

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CHINA

The structural principles of <u>Chinese</u> <u>architecture</u> have remained largely unchanged, the main changes being only the decorative details. Since the <u>Tang</u> <u>Dynasty</u>, Chinese architecture has had a major influence on the architectural styles of <u>Japan</u>, <u>Korea</u>, <u>Taiwan</u>, and <u>Vietnam</u>.

Forbidden City, Beijing



- The Hall of Supreme Harmony within the Palace Museum (<u>Forbidden City</u>) grounds in <u>Beijing</u>, <u>Ming Dynasty</u>
- There were certain architectural features that were reserved solely for buildings built for the <u>Emperor of China</u>. One example is the use of yellow roof tiles; yellow having been the Imperial color, yellow roof tiles still adorn most of the buildings within the <u>Forbidden City</u>.

Forbidden City



 The Temple of Heaven, however, uses blue roof tiles to symbolize the sky. The roofs are almost invariably supported by brackets ("dougong"), a feature shared only with the largest of religious buildings. The wooden columns of the buildings, as well as the surface of the walls, tend to be red in color. Black is also a famous color often used in pagodas. They believe the gods are inspired by the black color to descend on to the earth








Zhuozheng Garden, Suzhou, Jiangsu province




Japan



Originally heavily influenced by <u>Chinese</u> <u>architecture</u>, it has also developed many differences and aspects which are indigenous to Japan.








Taj Mahal

 Shah Jahan, Emperor during Mughal's period of greatest prosperity, was grief-stricken in 1631 when his third wife, Mumtaz Mahal, died during the birth of their fourteenth child. Court chronicles illustrate the love story traditionally held as the inspiration for the Taj Mahal. Construction began soon after Mumtaz's death with the principal mausoleum completed in 1648. The surrounding buildings and garden were finished five years later.

- The Taj Mahal is a <u>mausoleum</u> located in <u>Agra</u>, <u>India</u>, built under <u>Mughal Emperor Shah Jahan</u> in memory of his favourite wife, <u>Mumtaz Mahal</u>.
- The Taj Mahal is considered as the finest example of <u>Mughal architecture</u>, a style that combines elements from <u>Persian</u>, <u>Turkish</u>, <u>Indian</u>, and <u>Islamic</u> architectural styles. In 1983, Taj Mahal became a <u>UNESCO World Heritage</u> <u>Site</u> and was cited as "the jewel of <u>Muslim art</u> in India and one of the universally admired masterpieces of the world's heritage."[
