
## Building a New Nation 1785-1820 Revolution and its aftermath



 One-third of all Revolutionary battles were fought within the boundaries of present day New York City



- Served as the military headquarters of Great Britain
- Occupied for seven years



Suffered physically and economically



Briefly served as national and state capitals



 New York had to rebuild after devastating losses

### **Eclecticism**

- Emotional and/or intellectual associations
- A romantic idea that a building or style is "good" because of its connection to a period of history whose image is educational or inspiring.
- 1785-1820 is a period of synthetic eclecticism

## **Building Technology**

Introduction of American pattern books

A pattern book is a means of education for carpenters, builders and owners. It contains basic designs and practical instruction on the construction of structural and geometric forms



 Asher Benjamin wrote the first American pattern book in 1797. It was titled *The* Country Builder's Assistant





- Modest scale
- Simple architectural ornamentation
- Greater freedom with forms







Generally 2-3 stories high with a basement and an attic with dormer windows



- Build of brick laid in a Flemish bond pattern and a brownstone base
- Also built in wood



Brick bond patterns




- Peaked or low hipped roofs
- Openings-simple




 Moldings and columns simpler, narrow Exterior decoration confined to porch, entrance and cornice









# Poe Cottage, vernacular, ca 1812






## Commissioners' Plan of 1811






■ The Erie Canal opened in 1825


