Ms Colombia aka Osvaldo Gomez, I would always see her at the parades or just walking around carrying her small dog in a stroller, she would always tell jokes and be such a vibrant energy for this community, sadly she passed away at 64 years old and when the news broke out everyone starting talking about it, in social media or if you run into someone who belonged to the community they would bring the topic up.

Don't be shy, Colombians are quite friendly and don't worry if you don't speak Spanish, they'll understand you.
