WHICH DEFINITIONS DID YOU GET RIGHT?

Vocab Term	Definition
Academic Alert	Students are placed on Academic Alert at the end of a semester if they do not meet the minimum cumulative GPA requirements set by the College.
Attempted Hours	Attempted Credits are the total credit hours of classes taken by a student, whether or not a student received credit for the classes by passing. Students' attempted credits may equal no more than 150% of the total credits they accrue.
Hold	A hold is a stop placed on a student's record that may prevent them from registering or using certain college resources. Holds may be financial, academic, or based on other requirements.
Service Indicator	A note on a student record. Depending on the nature of the note, this may lead to a hold or a block being placed on a student account.





Hard Skills vs. Soft Skills: What's the Difference?

Hard Skills:

Specific knowledge and abilities needed in order to perform a certain job

For example: An architect needs to be able to draft blueprints, have a knowledge of the strengths and uses of various building materials, etc.

Soft Skills:

Knowledge and abilities that don't directly relate to a certain job, but that make an employee valuable

For example: communication skills, interpersonal skills, managerials skills, etc.
