BLOCK QUOTES OF FOUR OR MORE LINES

When they are more than four lines, indent and block your quotes one inch from the left margin. Block quotations should be double-spaced (same as the text of your paper) but not enclosed in quotation marks.

The lengthy prayer with which Thomas Malory ends <u>The Morte</u>

<u>Darthur</u> conveys what many would call the medieval period's central concern:

I pray you all gentlemen and gentlewomen that readeth this book of Arthur and his knights from the beginning to the ending, pray for me while I am alive that God send me good deliverance. And when I am dead, I pray you all pray for my soul even as you would pray for your own. (412)

Notice that:

- 1. Always use a colon at the end of the signal phrase.
- 2. Quotation marks are not used to open/close block quotes.
- 3. Block quotes are indented 10 spaces from the left margin. It is not acceptable for paragraph indentations and block quote indentations to match up, for the block quote indentation must be deeper.
- 4. Block quotes run flush to the right margin.
- 5. Punctuation goes at the end of the quote's final sentence, not after the page number.
