RUNNING OBSERVATION:

14.00

I arrive just after 2 pm on a cool spring day and sit andthe bench opposite the waterfall. Nobodypasses for the first ten minutes thought the other parts of the park are verypopulated.

14.10

A group of teenagers pass from the north side stoppingbriefly to look at the waterfall. At thesame time a father with two young children arrives from the south, hears thefalls before seeing it, surprised he encourages his children to stay for aminute and observes the falls and some birds around its base.

14.30

Over the next twenty minutes several varying demographicspass, this area is an important node between two areas of the park. I've observed two distinct groups that passthis small area, the first are those who come intentionally to quietly observethis feature of the park enroute to another area or as part of their walkingtour of the park, and the second group are those who come across this spot bychance never knowing the falls existed, and are invariably pleased to find them.

Microclimate-

The area is generallay cooler than the open spaces surrounding it in part because of the shade provided by the wild growth and part from the water fall releasing water vapour into the area, this corner of the park is like a small oasis of sorts.

Circulation-

This site's position in the center of the park between two of the most utilized areas makes it a major pedestriand hub and ensures a large number of new and recurring visitors on a daily basis, during any season.

PROSPECT PARK, QUAKER HILL INVENTORY:

I am visiting a part of ProspectPark called Quaker hill, between the baseball diamonds and Nethermead. This area consists mainly of unkempt swathesof land allowing for natural growth of native plants. There are many small paths paved andotherwise crisscrossing through wooded areas, and proved the park a contrast ofthe more manicured hardscapes of other areas. The point I and focusing on is where the path to the baseball diamondsbottle necks with the "upper pool" pond to one side and the Fallhill waterfalls to the other. There is one benchfacing the falls and a small wooden bridge on the side of the bench away from the baseball fields, the thick vegetation mutes the noise from the surroundingareas and creates a sense of seclusion, intimacy and privacy. This area is in generally good condition asis save for the sparsely scattered bits of litter.
